
Finance and Investments Working Group

- Agroecology Finance Tracking Tool based on a framework developed by a community of practice on tracking agroecology finance flows. Anchored on the 13 principles of agroecology, this online tool can be used to assess project portfolios and to measure progress in finance towards agroecology. It also serves as a guide in elaborating agroecology projects. It was launched in October 2023 and can be accessed here.




MEMBERSHIP

The membership of the Agroecology Coalition has increased significantly. It reached 215 members, including 48 governments and 1 regional administration, 3 regional commissions and 163 organizations.

As of 1st January 2023, the Agroecology Coalition was composed of 133 members including 42 governments, 3 regional commissions and 87 organizations.


By 31 December 2023, 5 governments, 1 regional administration and 72 organizations joined, representing an increase of 61% in the overall membership.

Most of the members are non-governmental organizations and civil society organizations (45%), followed by regions/countries/regional commissions (25%) and research organizations (16%). Other members include United Nations and other international organizations, farmers associations, Indigenous Peoples' associations, philanthropy and donors, and small and medium enterprises.

The Coalition attracted new member countries. Hopefully, this will lead to increased visibility of agroecology in all continents and will foster commitments from decisionmakers at national, regional and international levels. We also expect that this increase will

attract other countries to join the Coalition and to enhance the visibility of agroecology in regional policy arenas (i.e. IICA, EU, ASEAN). The Secretariat is establishing closer links with the members to ensure their active participation and to promote greater ownership.

Some of things we have in the pipeline in 2024:

- Finalizing the Agroecology Coalition Strategy.
- Participating in the Conferences of Parties (COPs) on climate, biodiversity and desertification to further and advance agroecology as a cross-cutting approach that allows to reach the objectives of the three Rio Conventions.
- Supporting members' activities and fostering their engagement within the Agroecology Coalition.
- Continuing to increase awareness of decision-makers, stakeholders and general public of the 13 agroecology principles and the 10 elements of agroecology via sideevents, key messages, and the repository of key messages, and the case studies.
- Assessing the first results of the data compiled through the Agroecology Financing Assessment Tool.
